AB 361 Emergency Legislation Regarding Brown Act Meeting Requirements Board Approved:

Whereas, the Governor signed an Executive Order Suspending the Brown Act until October 1, 2021,

Whereas, the Governor signed Emergency Legislation AB 361 in September 2021,

Whereas, according to AB 361, the public charter school Board may take advantage of additional flexibility in teleconference meetings so long as the school complies with the following:

- The public has access via internet and/or telephone to the Board meeting and can provide public comment in some electronic form,
- The charter school uses it sound discretion and makes reasonable efforts to adhere, as closely as possible, to the other provisions of the Brown Act in order to maximize transparency and provide public access.

Whereas, AB 361 states that:

• If there is a state of emergency proclaimed by the Governor, the same suspension of teleconferencing rules apply, if either state or local officials have imposed or recommended measures to promote social distancing or, by Board vote a finding imminent risk to health or safety of attendees.

Whereas, SB 361 requires:

- The Board must provide means of how public comment will be available (internet/by phone);
- If a technical disruption occurs, no action can be taken; and
- No early requirement for public comment will be set into place and the Board shall allow for "real time" comments during full public comment period; and
- The Board makes a finding every 30 days to continue teleconferencing.

Therefore, based on the Board's 30-day reconsideration of the current circumstances of the State of Emergency and situations of the State of Emergency continues to directly impact the ability of members to meet safely in person, and/or the State or local officials continue to impose or recommend measures to promote social distancing;

The Board has determined that it will hold its next meeting in a hybrid mode allowing Board Members and the public to attend the meetings in person using social distancing requirements or virtually given individual needs and choice of the attendee.

Strengths:

Empower Generations supports pregnant and parenting teens to meet their individual goals through a whole person, whole family approach. Empower

Generations provides pregnant and parenting teens a trauma-informed environment to explore and gain confidence in the unique challenge of young parenthood. With clear and personalized guidance, learners determine their course of study and method of obtaining graduation requirements, including internship, online courses, independent study, and one-on-one support. Learners realize their potential as confident parents, engaged learners, and active community members while working toward a high school diploma and gaining invaluable real-life experience.

Empower Generations conducted an analysis of their educational partner input and local data to determine their current strengths and progress in Building Relationships Between School Staff and Families. Our site strongly believes in parent engagement so that we may support the whole child in both academic and social-emotional development. We currently complete Individual Learning Plans (ILPs) in the first semester with our learners where they set goals based on their strengths and challenges. In the Spring semester, we conduct Learner-Led Conferences (LLCs) as an opportunity for learners to present how they achieved/not achieved their ILP goals. Families are included in both of the processes. In addition, we send weekly Monday messages, we communicate with families through Parent Square, we hold several community events where families are encouraged to attend, send workshop emails and use social media as a way to connect.

Focus:

Based on input from all stakeholders, there is a need to strengthen and expand support and opportunities for parents/families and learners to understand how to succeed academically and social/emotionally, to increase learners' and family connectedness to a safe, supportive, and stable learning environment, and to increase engagement with community and school activities.

Another area of improvement includes inviting families to monthly Parent Universities where they can learn about various aspects of our pedagogies, social emotional tools, pregnant and parenting tools and more.

Strengths:

Decision-making and school-wide planning are conducted in a collaborative and inclusive manner at Empower Generations. Our site strongly believes in parent engagement so that we may support the whole child in both academic and social emotional development. We currently complete Individual Learning Plans (ILPs) in the first semester with our learners where they set goals based on their strengths and challenges In the Spring semester, we conduct Learner-Led Conferences (LLCs) as an opportunity for learners to present how they achieved/not achieved their ILP goals. We also reach out to our families to work with our learners during our resource time on Fridays. We held our first Student Site Council and iSUPPORT meetings both which encourage families to be a part of our decision making process.

Focus:

As a result of specific stakeholder feedback, it was determined that staff could benefit from diversity, equity and inclusion training. Due to the effects of the pandemic, additional social emotional training and support will be provided through training for all staff in trauma informed practices, the collection of social emotional data, and social events or counseling to support families and learners.

Empower Generations believes that developing both academic and social-emotional skills are critical to school, career, and life success. We use the Panorama Education survey platform to create and distribute an assessment tool to help measure learners' perceptions of their academic and social-emotional growth, their relationships with their Educational Facilitators, as well as their leadership and self-management skills. In March 2022, 34 learners took the Empower Generations Learner Survey, with the following results:

1. Academic Engagement:

Learner perceptions about their level of academic engagement at the school. For example, are they excited to learn new things? Are they self-directed learners?

67% Favorable Responses Overall

42% of Empower Generation learners felt strongly that they are excited to participate in school each day. In addition, 42% of the learners felt their lessons, assignments, and projects were interesting to them. 77% of the learners felt that the school creates a friendly and welcoming learning environment and provides engaging activities. 86% of learners reported that they have many opportunities to share their ideas and help make decisions about their learning experiences; for example, projects, learning activities, internships, field studies, service projects, etc. 88% of Empower Generations's learners felt that their school helps them grow as self-directed learners. They identified communication, counselors, and Restorative Circles as the most important things the school does to create a positive school community.

2. School Facilitator-Learner Relationships:

Student perceptions of how strong the social connection is between iLEAD educators and learners within and beyond the school.

94% Favorable Responses Overall 97% of learners feel that their Guide is excited to help them meet their learning goals, and 90% feel connected to at least one adult (academic coach, facilitator, counselor, tutor, etc.) at Empower Generations. The score in this domain has risen 4 points since the previous year.

3. Self-Management

How well learners manage their emotions, thoughts, and behaviors in different situations.

79% Favorable Responses Overall

79% of the learners' feel that they are developing self-management skills through our social-emotional program (7 Habits, SLOs, etc.) that will help them become effective leaders.

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Acceleration and Retention Policy Board Approved: May 13, 2021

The Governing Board expects learners to progress through each grade level within one school year. To accomplish this, instruction should accommodate the variety of ways that learners learn and include strategies for addressing academic deficiencies when needed.

Learners shall progress through the grade levels by demonstrating growth in learning, meeting grade level standards, and obtaining high school course credits of expected learner achievement.

Learners shall be identified for acceleration or retention based on the following data:

- CAASPP scores
- NWEA MAP assessments
- Other summative and formative assessments in ELA, writing, and mathematics
- Grades
- High School Credits
- Facilitator observations/feedback
- Any other relevant data in the Student Study Team (SST) process

Acceleration

Acceleration is possible when high academic achievement is evident. However, the learner's social and emotional growth shall be taken into consideration before placing them in a higher grade. The School Director or designee may recommend a learner for acceleration into a higher grade level upon review of the Student Study Team's (SST) findings.

Acceleration Guidelines - Grades 9 -12

The following guidelines for acceleration shall be implemented:

1. When a facilitator or parent/guardian feels a learner should be considered for acceleration, they shall review all available data and then discuss the case fully with the SST. If the learner has more than one regular classroom facilitator, the School Director or designee shall specify the facilitator(s) responsible for discussing the case with the SST.

2. The SST may consider the learner's grades, facilitator observations,

assessment results, performance-based assessments, participation in available supplemental instruction programs, and any other relevant data or information available to the SST.

3. The learner should be performing several grades above their current grade level according to work produced and standardized test scores.

4. The SST's decision to accelerate a learner shall be based on what action best serves the child and shall include relevant social and emotional concerns.

5. The parent/guardian shall be involved in any decision regarding acceleration of a learner.

6. A grade level adjustment document, signed by the team, shall be placed in the learner's cumulative file.

Retention

The Governing Board recognizes that very few children benefit from being retained. When any learner is retained or recommended for retention, the School Director or designee shall offer programs of direct, systematic, and intensive supplemental instruction and social emotional support through Multi-Tiered Systems of Support (MTSS). Learners shall be identified on the basis of academic achievement, social and emotional maturity, and the number of credits earned during the school year in accordance with law, Board Policy, and the following criteria. <u>**Consideration of</u> retention for learners with an IEP will be discussed at an IEP meeting before a decision is made by the School Director or designee. **

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Retention Guidelines - High School

Learners in grades 9-12 are not retained into lower grades but must meet graduation course and credit requirements based on school, State, and board policy for graduation from high school.
